

Therefore, CERID with the collaboration of UNESCO Kathmandu prepared an Inventory of NFE Organization in 2006. This one is update of the Inventory which provides relatively complete database that help NFE providers refine their approaches, strategies and programs; and enhance qualitative and quantitative improvement in the national NFE endeavors.

I appreciate UNESCO Kathmandu, especially Mr. Tapa Raj Pant, National Program Officer, and Mr. Ram Balak Singh for their cooperation to commission this work to CERID. #### **Foreword**

The commitment of Dakar Framework of Action in reducing illiteracy forms an integral part of Nepal Education for All National Plan of Action 2001-2015. Literacy and non-formal education programs are locally specific and varied in their contents to serve the multi-dimensional needs of concerned stakeholders. In this regard, Non-Formal Education Providers in Nepal need adequate and consolidated information on the progress made towards achieving the goals of literacy and non-formal education along with innovative ideas and actions in order to share and disseminate knowledge to wider audiences.

The preparation of an inventory of Non-Formal Education providers was the long felt need of all sectors i.e. GOs, NGOs and INGOs in order to throw light on how these organizations conduct their activities to meet their objectives and contribute towards accelerating literacy and non-formal education.

Hence, Non-Formal Education Center (NFEC) in collaboration with UNESCO Office in Kathmandu and with the technical support of Research Center for Educational Innovation and Development (CERID) initiated the task to prepare the "Inventory of Non-Formal Education Providers in Nepal" in 2006 with a view to identifying related organizations involved in literacy and non-formal education and provide a basis to expand networking and linkages among these organizations. Considering the need and demand of the updated inventory in the present context, we have produced this updated version of the "Inventory of Non-Formal Education Providers in Nepal" 2009.

The initial task towards preparing the inventory of non-formal education providers in Nepal focused on the collection and compilation of information related with non-formal education. A rapid survey and consultation meeting among the Non-formal Education Network members were carried out to assess how far the institutions providing non-formal education share each other's experiences and link their activities for maximizing the outcomes of program implementation.

This Inventory contains information of different I/NGOs and GOs that include their name, date of establishment, address, head of the institution, number of staff, sources of funding, major publications, objectives and achievements of the institution.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to UNESCO Kathmandu, especially Mr Tap Raj Pant, Mr Ram Balak Singh and Mrs Aliza Shrestha Dhungana and the CERID team for their financial and technical support in the preparation of this document. I hope this Inventory provides useful information on literacy and nonformal education providers in Nepal, which will be extremely helpful in forming networks of concerned stakeholders to identify and strengthen the non-formal education/literacy practices in Nepal.

#### Inventory of Non-formal Education in Nepal

#### **Background**

In Nepal, NFE has been conducting since the initiation of modern education, as an alternative way, to provide educational opportunity to those who could not get education from formal schools and institutes. NFE program in those days was merely reduced to literacy programs. With the change in the development philosophy and strategies, NFE became a powerful vehicle for community and human resource development, empowerment and poverty reduction. So NFE encompasses children, youths and adults; disadvantaged and discriminated as target groups, and offers varieties of programs to these groups in addressing their needs. Similarly, several organizations, government and non-government, from centre to district and local levels included themselves in NFE. Some design and conduct NFE programs while some make resources available for the program. Despite, some organizations conduct research and evaluation whereas some provide policy supports. These efforts, of course, attempt to expand NFE for human development through fostering human skills in areas such as education, social living, health, awareness building, income generation, civic awareness, human rights, and so forth. In designing and conducting the NFE programs and activities, these organizations have used their own approaches, strategies and methods mostly ignoring what the similar kind of organizations have done, or have been advancing their activities. These organizations rarely accredit the significance of sharing, co-operation, and mutual understanding and partnership. Maybe these organizations do not know each other and their activities, since there is very little room for them to know each other and share their ideas and experiences. Absence of a forum where they meet, discuss and share the experiences further limits capacity of these organizations to expand their knowledge base and skills required for improving their strategies and methods for program operation. Therefore, NFE in Nepal at present faces several challenges in policy, management, implementation, coordination and so forth. With a view to fight against these challenges, the Government of Nepal in 2003 brought NFE Policy 2063, which stressed, besides many things, as follows as policy for NFE management and implementation:

- mobilization of government and non-government organizations for meeting the targets of EFA.
- decentralization of implementation, monitoring, supervision and evaluation of NFE programs
- maintenance of networking and coordination with the agencies involved in NFE for resource generation and mobilization
- development and sharing of common database among the agencies involved in NFE programs
- capacity development of human resources involved in the NFE programs through training, research, self-monitoring and innovation
- coordination and collaboration with government, non-governmental, and international non-governmental organizations for creating cooperative environment among the agencies involved in NFE programs.

Implementation of these policies, of course, requires information about organizations and agencies involved in NFE. Therefore, a profile stating backgrounds, objectives, operation methods, worksites, funding sources, nature and composition of participants, achievements, etc. of NFE providers would naturally provides necessary database of NFE providers which assists in knowing each other, their programs and experience in conducting NFE programs and problems they face, their strengths and limitations. To this end, an initiative was taken by UNESCO Country Office Nepal with the collaboration of NFEC and CERID to develop an NFE inventory. The inventory was published first in 2006. This work is an extension of the previous one by CERID for updating the inventory. In fact, this inventory includes relatively complete database that help NFE providers improve their approaches, strategies and programs; and enhance the operation of the national NFE endeavors.

#### Objective

The main objective of this activity was to prepare database of NFE providers so that networking and linkage between various organizations that provide different kinds of non-formal education in different locations could be expanded. However, the inventory also facilitates NFE providers to share their experiences in conducting NFE programs.

#### **Procedures for Updating Inventory**

This inventory was updated by completing the information of NFE providers included in erstwhile inventory; and adding profiles of some new NFE providers. However, the following strategies were adopted for updating the inventory:

#### Review of NFE Inventory 2006

NFE Inventory published in 2006 was reviewed. To develop the inventory, a Steering Committee under the chairmanship of Executive Director of CERID was formed to steer and streamline the inventory preparation activities. NFEC Director and representatives from UNESCO and Social Welfare Council (SWC) including Project Coordinator from CERID were involved as members. Several meetings of Steering Committee were held during preparations of the inventory; and a data collection schedule was developed to prepare profiles of NGOs. This schedule was finalized after incorporating comments from stakeholders.

In the mean time, official advertisement from NFEC in media requesting to furnish the data sheet was made. Two members research team was formed to explore the sources of information, and monitoring data collection activity. However, data collection activity was confined in Kathmandu valley. Personal contacts, expediting of official records and interview were major sources of data collection. In this respect, official records of 198 NGOs were identified and 80 NGOs were contacted and filled out the data sheet.

In the inventory, profile of 68 NGOs and 12 INGOs were included. Of them, 40 NGOs were located in Kathmandu valley and 28 outside the valley. Official records of NGOs registered in SWC seem patchy and partial- detailed information was not available. Most NGOs did not disclose their sources of funding. Many NGOs did not provide information on publications and achievements. Information not available could be seen in

data sheet of several NGOs. There were several limitations in the inventory. The inventory did not provide desired database, and it was not sure whether the inventory was used, because distribution of the inventory was not ensured. So it is not ensured whether the inventory supported to expand linkages and networking in NFE providers.

#### Review Meeting

Review meetings were held in CERID where representatives from NFEC, UNESCO and CERID participate. The meeting discussed in the information required and need for completing the information and adding new NFE providers. Previously developed data sheet for profile was also reviewed and redesigned. This data sheet was finalized after incorporating comments from participants of meeting.

#### Data Collection

At first, the NFE providers were identified through reviewing the NFE Inventory 2006, and personal contacts. Data sheet were sent to the providers by email and personally. Also, CERID researchers visited several organizations several times asking for furnishing the data sheet. Many organizations sent their profiles by email, and CERID researchers also received profiles of some organizations personally. Data collection activity was confined in Kathmandu, even if organizations located in outside Kathmandu provided their profiles.

#### **Data Analysis**

Even though several organizations were identified and approached for including their profiles in this inventory, a total of 55 organizations filled out the data sheet and made their information available. Of the total NFE organizations, 2 are government organizations (GOs), 39 NGOs, 10 INGOs, 2 CLCs, 1 research centre and remaining 1 is the indigenous people's organization. Most of these organizations located in Kathmandu valley; however, they conducted their programs in different districts and locations of the country.

The qualifications of the institutional heads range from Ph. D. to Intermediate Level. The number of staff involved in these organizations ranges from a minimum of 1 to a maximum number of 193.

The objectives of these organizations cover a wide range. Besides literacy and post literacy, empowerment of deprived and discriminated groups is found to be the common objective of these organizations. No doubt, empowerment is a broader concept which covers various kinds of human development needs; it naturally encompasses wider scope of activities. However, the objectives covered by the NFE organizations could be categorized broadly as: (1) raising the level of critical awareness of the people on socio-cultural, economic, educational, environmental, and health issues, (2) conducting alternative schooling programs (3) conducting functional literacy activities with focus on basic life-skills, (4) conducting skills and development activities for income generation, (5) organizing environmental preservation activities for sustainable development and (6) empowering women and other stakeholders against violence and trafficking (7) energizing people to be perceptive concerning human rights and democracy, and (8) conduct ing research studies in contemporary educational and NFE issues.

Most of the NGOs and other organizations received resource support from various international organizations to run their activities. Since INGOs could not conduct program by themselves, they supported NGOs. Some UN organizations like UNESCO, UNICEF, UNDP and UNFPA have also provided resources to NGOs.

- Women empowerment program in Morang and Nawalparasi has promoted local political parties to be gender balanced and inclusive.
- The consumers' groups (Parents-Teachers Association, Women's group, Water and sanitation users group, forest users group, local child and youth clubs) efforts has been successful to make government school, VDCs and NGOs working there transparent, accountable and participatory.

For this, in August-September 2008, Haliya Rights Movement was organized from district to centre (Kathmandu) with the initiation of Haliya Mukti Samaj Federation and support of LWF Nepal, NNDSWO and other rights holders organisations.
- 28 VDC level solidarity networks and pressure groups of rights holders formed in Banke and Kailali districts.
   A total of 362 people particularly from Dalit community have been associated in the networks and groups.

Our Cross Boarder Trafficking Program caters to potential girls and women who are in risk of being trafficked and those who have escaped or have been saved from the trafficking situation. Through our Creating safe Environment for Girls Working in Entertainment Sector we serve those women who are in high risk of being sexually victimized in their work place. These are women with very little or no education, have been displaced by conflict and have no other means of earning their living other than working in cabin or dance restaurants or massage parlours. Similarly, SAATHI also looks after children affected by armed conflict, orphans, destitute children and street children as they are very much linked with violence against women.

- Saathi has been actively involved in social mobilization from the rural community level to the urban central level and through its groups and networks involved in intensive advocacy work against domestic violence. Saathi first started lobbying for domestic violence legislation and was the first organization to draft a bill on domestic violence and lobby with the parliamentarians and governments for its enactment since the last fourteen years. We are proud to inform that after a lot of struggle and continued advocacy the Domestic Violence Act was passed in April this year. Also through its mass awareness programs including media mobilization Saathi has managed to bring much national attention to the issue of domestic violence which was until few years considered a very private affair.

- 1. Plan International has been working with the poor and marginalised people of Nepal since 1978. Having transformed the service-delivery model it once espoused, Plan now seeks to make its child-centred community development (CCCD) approach even more participatory and to reach many more girls and boys. In its efforts to prioritise and make choices, it is guided by the CRC, Plan's Strategic Directions & Principles, Nepal's Millennium Development Goals, the policies of various government sectors, Nepal's Poverty Reduction Strategy Paper and the National Plan of Action for Children
- 2. Goals: Plan Nepal has identified certain key issues which affect children and made strategic choices to address these. Its choices are reflected in its goals, which are designed to ensure that Plan's fight to eradicate poverty and exclusion succeeds and contributes to development
  - Key issues: Children and women of child-bearing age are vulnerable and succumb to preventable diseases, due to malnutrition and inadequate reproductive health services
- 3. Goal 1: The health status of children and women, especially of the marginalised, is improved and they realise their right to grow up healthy and be protected from preventable diseases
  - Key issues: Children are at risk of exposure to communicable diseases and women to more drudgery due to inadequate access to safe drinking water and environmental sanitation, and to poor hygiene and living conditions
- 4. Goal 2: Children realise their right to live in a healthy environment with adequate, reliable and safe drinking water and sanitation services and practice hygienic behaviour all year round
  - Key issues: Access to early childhood care and development (ECCD) programmes and to formal and non-formal primary education is limited; many children drop out and repeat classes; the quality of education is poor and the learning environment unfriendly; community awareness about and participation in education is low; and adult illiteracy is high
- 5. Goal 3: Children, especially marginalised girls, realise their right to education in an appropriate, good-quality learning environment that is safe, sound, and child-friendly
  - Key issues: Many families landless and less skilled to earn income from off farm employment; food insecurity is rife; environmental degradation is increasing and agricultural productivity is low and declining; and there are no social safety nets to cope with emergencies and frequent disasters
- 6. Goal 4: Children and families are ensured of sufficient household economic security to enable them to meet their basic needs and to cope with emergencies, including natural disasters
  - Key issues: Children not fully involved in making decisions and getting resources allocated in their best interests. Children, especially girls from poor and excluded families, do not have adequate protection from abuse, exploitation and discrimination. Child marriage, trafficking, sexual abuse and child labour widespread; no juvenile justice system; growing number of children affected by conflict
- 7. Goal 5: Children, especially the excluded and those at risk, realise their right to participation by being involved in making decisions in their best interests, and to protection by living in a safe and enabling environment

- Key issues: Children, communities, sponsors and key developmental actors do not share a common understanding of child-centred community development
- 8. Goal 6: A common agenda to alleviate child poverty by practising child-centred development is shared by sponsors, children and other development actors

- Quality education for the youngest learners has been improved through Early Childhood Development Centres in Sunsari and Rukum.
- Action has been taken to get needy children into education through home visits and interaction programmes. 233 students are receiving scholarships.
- The partner schools have become Leader Schools in their catchment areas, supporting, sharing and learning together. All have taken part in management and governance trainings enabling their School Committees and Parent Associations to improve standards.
- UMN partners are also active in education networks for advocacy issues and access to resources for both adults and children.
